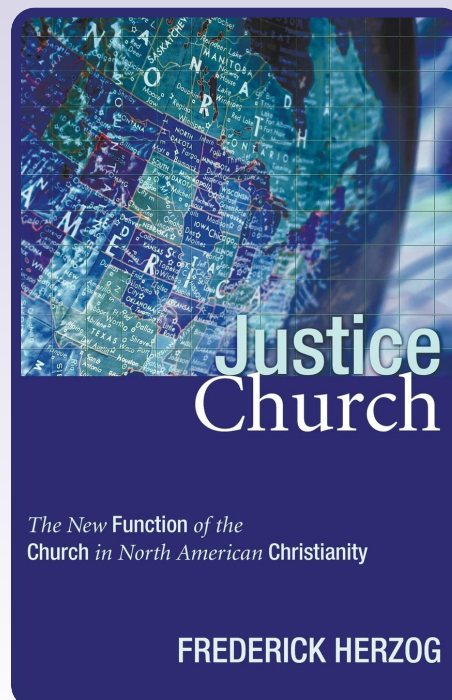
Who?
